# The President's Message

## Searchers board minutes – Feb 2020

The Searchers board met on Feb 4, 2020. Significant items include:

Bylaws: the changes (updates to payment methods) that were approved by the Searchers members at the November 2018 meeting are now signed, and therefore in effect. The updated Bylaws are available at our website. The board members will now review the Bylaws and other Searchers documents to see if any more changes need to be made this year; the discussion will continue at the March board meeting.

Budget: we started work on the budget. President Kim Strange showed examples of accounting techniques that are commonly used by companies to analyze their finances. Adrian Callard presented a proposed budget for the workshop in 2020. The discussion will continue at the March board meeting.

Card readers: we decided to purchase a Square card reader for the Searchers organization, which will let us accept contactless, chip, and magstripe credit cards. Several members who have small businesses say the Square is more reliable than our current CloverGo readers, and the Square doesn't charge monthly fees. We'll test the Square and, if it works well for our needs, we'll decide whether we need to get more.

## Searchers meeting minutes - Feb 2020

The Searchers met on February 11 at the Anaheim Downtown Center. The guest speaker was Andrew Hoekstra, who gave a presentation about the geology and scenery of southern Utah, with an emphasis on areas where you can collect, and what you can collect there. Andrew also spoke about efforts to restore recreational rockhounding to several areas that were set aside for a proposed National Monument. Many areas were later removed from the proposal, but collecting there was still forbidden. With a lot of work from Andrew and a few friends, most of those areas are open once again to rockhounding.

# Afton Canyon, CA March 7-8, 2020

Leader: John O'Connor

Details: Afton Canyon in the North Cady Mountains is a beautiful place to explore and scour the washes and upper ridges for a unique blend of jaspers in red/purple/orange/gold/mustard, agates with inclusions, jasp-agates, hematite, and some interesting onyx in float. This area provides an easy access dry BLM Campground with pit toilets next to the mouth of the Canyon, the Mojave River, and the train trestle. Across the River and under the trestle, opposite



the campground is Pyramid Canyon. Exploring up this canyon and on the upper ridges is bound to produce some interesting specimens and cutting material. On Saturday, we'll meet up at 8:30 and depart at 9am to explore the hikable terrain from the campground and have a potluck dinner and bonfire in the evening. For those who stay on Sunday, we'll take votes on driving around to enter the Canyon from Basin Rd, exploring some boggy deposits across I-15 to the North, or continuing exploration deeper up the Canyons. The BLM campground is accessible by 2wd vehicles, beyond the campground is 4wd only high clearance, and if we go around to Basin Rd, it's 4wd, but Subaru type clearance can be appropriate. Details: We'll be heading next to Opal Mountain North of Hinkley, CA. This area is known for common opal in a variety of colors including orange, cherry, white, variated, and rarely precious. There are also some interesting warty thundereggs with waterline agates in the centers and some other jaspers to find along the way. Archaelogical buffs might be drawn to some petroglyphs in the canyons. Jimmie has a jar of precious to prove it, so make sure you ask to see it! We'll camp on an abandoned ranch (GPS: 34.972556, -117.191479) and have a bonfire and potluck on Saturday night. We'll meet at the camp at 8:30am and depart at 9am for collecting. This is a dry camping scenario so bring all your own supplies. This is a 4wd trip due to soft sand and some rocky terrain.

## **FIELD TRIP REPORT**

# Trilobites, Grossular Garnet and Epidote February 22-23, 2020

The initial concern for rain did not dampen the enthusiasm of the 20 Searchers and friends who went in search of trilobites and other things in the Marble Mountain area on February 22-23. There were even a half dozen folks from Arizona who heard about the trip and joined us. The high cloud cover provided dramatic backdrops to the rugged mountain areas that held the trilobite material. The group camped on the flat area to the south of the mountains nearby Siam Siding in the Cadiz area. A group of 30 Boy Scouts camped nearby working with their parents on Geology and Camping Badges, but there was plenty of open space. Trilobites are extinct arthropods that disappeared approximately 250 million years ago. The name refers to the three long spinal sections of the skeleton. The Marble Mountain Fossil Beds lie in a beautiful shale formation that is 60-feet thick and over 550 million years old. The group spent Saturday morning with the trilobites and then, after lunch, went looking for a new site above the town of Chambless for grossular garnets, epidote and hematite. Actually an old iron mine, the area was very rocky and we were honored to share it with a lone female bighorn sheep. That trip was 4WD only, but there were enough such vehicles to get everyone up there. Saturday night was the usual potluck







and campfire and on Sunday, after a blustery night, we tried another spot for those pesky garnets, this time with some success! The climate, the views and the experience of being outdoors is almost as wonderful as finding special material that's thousands — if not millions — of years old. We broke camp after lunch and left for home.

## The "Rim of the Valley" legislation threatens rock-hounding in Los Angeles & Ventura Counties

Collecting rocks or fossils will be forbidden on most of the hills surrounding the greater Los Angeles urban area, if this proposed federal takeover of local public parklands is enacted [see the map, or alternate map].

The "Rim of the Valley Corridor Preservation Act" (<u>H.R.1708</u> & <u>S.774</u>, sponsored by Adam Schiff and Dianne Feinstein) proposes that the federal government, specifically the National Park Service, take over the management of the hills surrounding the Simi, Conejo, Santa Clarita, La Crescenta, San Fernando, and San Gabriel Valleys, by adding these lands to the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. The proposal envisions the federal government assuming management of an additional 190,000 acres (297 square miles) of land in Los Angeles and Ventura counties. <u>Many of these acres are already local parkland</u> or other locally managed public lands. Less than one percent is currently federal land, and almost half the acreage is private land that would need to be purchased. The legislation promises that no landowner will be forced to sell. Without land purchases, the proposal does little or nothing to increase public recreational areas or access.

Unfortunately, the Rim of the Valley legislation would prohibit existing nature and science educational and recreational activities of individuals, schools and colleges, scout troops, and hobbyist clubs and nature study groups. The National Park service prohibits any collecting by the general public of even the most common natural materials, but serious study requires hands-on learning, including collecting. These hills are the last undeveloped local public lands accessible to students, hobbyists, and avocational scientists to study geology, mineralogy, paleontology, entomology and botany. It would also stifle research by students and professors at local colleges and universities due to the onerous permitting requirements of the National Park Service. National Park Service rules might also prohibit or hinder other popular existing public recreational activities.

Our local hills are not pristine wilderness and lack the exceptional scenic values of our national parks. Many are currently open to local residents for hiking, dog-walking, and mountain biking, as well as nature study. Collection of limited amounts of common rocks, fossils, insects, or plant material for personal use in study is not a threat to wildlife (endangered by development, habitat loss, and proliferation of non-native species), or to scientific resources (archeological resources and scientifically valuable fossils already have legal protection). Local government has the authority to act when necessary to protect special resources and scenic features on their public lands. Each local management authority has individually imposed the rules they find necessary for the lands they manage. I have heard few complaints from local residents. Local citizens deserve a voice in management of their local public recreational lands. They are more likely to be heard, and their opinions considered, by <u>local</u> elected public officials than by bureaucrats headquartered at Washington D.C.

The United States Department of the Interior and National Park Service oppose the Rim of the Valley legislation: written testimony to congress, dated April 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2019, states that the Department does not support enacting this proposed expansion at this time, due to higher priorities for spending.

Because of the consequences to nature science education and recreation, I suggest that the NPS is not an appropriate agency for the management of our local recreational parklands. It is preferable to retain the current management by local government, with local citizen input, while still implementing worthwhile improvements or expanding public parks and recreational areas.

## Other than our Bylaws, what other club documents exist?
