UPCOMING DUES INCREASE IMMINENT

As time marches on and the cost of everything else from gasoline to groceries it is time for the club to raise the membership dues. The Searchers Board recommends that our annual membership dues be increased as follows:

Individuals \$25.00 from \$20.00 Couples \$35.00 from \$25.00 Children \$10.00 from \$2.00 each

Our dues have not been increased for a long time. However, because of the very substantial increase in CFMS dues (\$9.75 per adult or child member) the Board has deemed this increase as necessary for the future of the Searchers. This means that for the past several years we actually lost money for every child member of the club.

Why must we pay CFMS dues? Primarily because the CFMS as a large group is able to offer the Searchers liability insurance which provides coverage for all meetings, workshops, shows and field trips. This type of insurance is not affordable and generally available elsewhere.

Every year the cost of the newsletter (printing and postage), monthly programs, and operating and maintaining the workshop has also increased. While we have encouraged members to take electronic delivery of the newsletter there are also costs associated with that such as Internet fees. We also are in the process of revamping the website to make it easier for members and potential members to get current information easier. The cost of our Annual Show has also increased. Some items that were once free now have a hefty price. The cost of professional security for the Annual Show has increased year after year as well as our fee for use of the Brookhurst Community Center, fire permits, plan checks, equipment rental, etc... Our Annual Show, and primary fundraiser for the year, generates revenue mainly from selling space at our show to Dealers and the Silent Auction since we no longer have the big donation award drawing.

This notice is to let the membership know that there will be a vote on this in the very near future, i.e. a general meeting. Please attend the monthly general meetings so we can all discuss this dues increase.


JULY FIELD TRIP

GOLD PANNING ON EAST FORK OF SAN GABRIEL RIVER
JULY 19, 2008

The Searchers July 19 field trip will be gold panning on the East Fork of the San Gabriel River. Bring your gold pans, sieves, sluices, digging tools, buckets, etc. Also bring sunscreen, lunch, water, and clothing to protect you from the sun and/or bugs. Be prepared for poor trails, SNAKES!, moving water (if you don't swim, I suggest wearing personal floatation devices), and all outdoor hazards. The Route 66 Gold Panners will be there; they will also help liven things up and help instruct gold panning. The Route 66ers are camping overnight and have invited us to join them for dinner; they will provide the burgers and we'll bring side dishes or dessert. If you plan on staying for dinner with the Route 66ers you must RSVP.

Directions: If you are coming from OC take the 55 fwy north to the 210 fwy and go west. Exit at Azusa Ave. and go north. Azusa Ave. becomes San Gabriel Canyon Rd. so follow this until you come to a bridge on your right. Turn right onto East Fork Rd. and follow it until you pass a picnic area on the right side of the road. Just beyond this is a cement restroom on the left side. We will meet east of there. (See map). I plan on being there about 8:00am. You can come anytime, but please sign in with me. Also let me know if you plan to attend the dinner. The Veterans Creative Arts Contest is an annual contest open to all patients from the Veterans Hospitals worldwide. Each hospital has its own contest and the 1st place winners from that contest move up to the Regional Level, then the 1st place winners of that contest move up to the National Level. There are thousands of entries from all over the world. Just to go the National Level is a huge achievement, but to win one of the top three places is an unbelievable achievement one can be quite proud of.

The National Veterans Creative Arts Festival (NVCAF) is the celebration and grand finale stage and art show of the culmination of talent competitions in art, creative writing, dance, drama and music for the veterans treated in the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) national health care system. Approximately 130 veterans will exhibit their artwork or perform in a gala show. All 1st place winners are selected to participate at the end of this year-long contest. This year's Gala Performance and Art Exhibit will be at the Riverside Convention Center, 3443 Orange Street, Riverside, California, 92501. The Festival is October 20-26, 2008; the Art Exhibit is Sunday, October 26, 2008, 12:15-1:45pm.

VA medical facilities incorporate creative arts into their recreation therapy programs. This annual competition recognizes the progress and recovery made through that therapy, and raises the visibility of the creative achievements of our nation's veterans after disease, disability or life crisis.

For Yesenia Rodriguez and the other twelve winners from Long Beach VA Medical Center (VRT) this has been a life-changing experience. We want to thank you for your support. Your support for our Long Beach program is the only reason this program is still available to these veterans today. Without your support this program would not exist today as it is the only lapidary class in the VA System. The Ruby's rich red color speaks of love and passion and fire. Some have said that the July birthstone gets its color from an everlasting eternal fire which cannot be extinguished. This makes it the perfect representation of eternal love. In some cultures ruby was worn by nobility as a way to ward off and warn of approaching evil, others thought it was a drop of the heart blood of Mother Earth. Ancient Orientals believed that The ruby burned with its own internal fire and as such called it a lamp stone.
