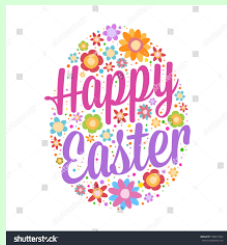

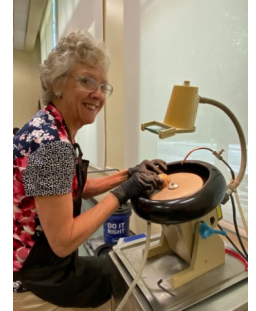

Searcher Presenters and News

April Speaker: Joseph W. Wright



Joseph is a retired Geologist and City Planner who currently teaches Geography at Mt. San Jacinto College. He initially obtained a B.S. in Geology from Brigham Young University (BYU), Provo, Utah and began working as a geologist for Utah County Department of Engineers, Utah. During this time, he observed that cities and counties were unknowingly approving housing developments on landslides and flood plains with unfortunate results. He saw the value to cities of having a city planner with a geology background so he decided to obtain a M.S. in Urban and Regional Planning from BYU. He utilized his geology background while working as a City Planner/Environmental Planner in California for the cities of Arvin, Pomona, Corona, and Anaheim before retiring in 2019. He loves the outdoors, backpacking, and geology and has produced over 60 videos of his geologic backpacking adventures throughout California and Utah. Subject: Afton Canyon

Joseph looks forward to sharing his experiences of Afton Canyon ... it is one of his favorite mineral collecting and geologic places to visit. He did a two-day backpacking trip to Afton Canyon and the Cady Mountains that was approximately 8 miles long and was perhaps his most successful geologic adventure in terms of finding both beautiful minerals and fossils near each other. In addition, the region's rugged beauty was awesome. Often referred to as the Grand Canyon of the Mojave Desert, Afton Canyon is a colorful, steep-walled canyon that was created by a massive flood nearly 18,000 years ago from an ancient lake called Lake Manix. This ancient lake, at its peak, was over 91 square-miles and 1,780 feet deep. The adjacent Cady Mountains are covered with basalt flows and sedimentary rocks that are filled with mineral crystals of jasper, milky quartz, blue agate, clear hexagonal quartz crystals, calcite crystals, and fossil cactails. He will show a video which includes his trail map and best locations for finding minerals and fossils.

There was a discussion about the difference between a nodule and a concretion. Concretions are formed around organic matter in a water environment. Nodules are voids in rocks that are later filled with other minerals. Septarians are actually concretions that are formed around a bit of plant or animal material. As the organic material decays and releases gases a void is created. The water in which the Septarian is in repeatedly dries and then becomes wet again. Minerals come in to fill the void. Calcite and aragonite are the most common minerals followed by barite and quartz. Sometimes fossils are also preserved in the matrix.

In the US, the place where most of the Septarian Nodules are found is near Kanab Utah in the Laver Tropic Shale formation. Paul had several cut and polished specimens for members to view.

SATURDAY APRIL 8TH RAINBOW LEDGE

We will be joined on the field trip by the Searchers Gem and Mineral Society from Anaheim, Ca. On the first day we will meet where the powerline crosses South Brown Rd at 8:30 am for meet and greet introductions and signups of non-members. From there we will proceed to Rainbow Ledge about 9:00 am. If time permits on the way back in, we can stop at the Old Car Mine for red jasper and opalite.

The Searchers will have their encampment on Wicknich Road off South Brown Road by the old quarry on Friday and Saturday evenings and they have graciously invited our members to share a potluck dinner with them on Saturday evening. So take something to share and any extra firewood would be greatly appreciated.

VEHICLE REQUIREMENTS: The road to Rainbow Ledge is currently in good condition and four wheel-drive is not necessary but the route crosses several washes with deep sand and some rocky areas where high clearance is recommended.

MATERIAL TO COLLECT: Once we arrive at the site the material is very plentiful in size, color and quantity. You will want to bring collecting bags/buckets, rock hammers, digging equipment, pry bars, safety glasses and spray bottles, water and maybe a camera.

SAFETY: These areas are very remote and the weather can be unpredictable this time of year. It can be windy and cool or hot so dress appropriately. There is no shade at the collecting areas so most definitely wear a hat and maybe a jacket. The collecting areas are on a hillsides with loose rocks and gravel. Footing can be loose and slippery so wear sturdy shoes/boots with plenty of ankle support. Bring plenty of water, lunch and snacks. Finally, there are all kinds of critters at the collecting area. Snakes, scorpions, tarantulas and others wildlife have been encountered on previous field trips so watch where you walk and place your hands, particularly under bushes, rocks, and burrows. With all of this year's rainfall there is a tremendous amount of vegetation growing thus much more cover for creepy crawly things to hide. Mojave green rattlesnakes are not uncommon in this area. Boot and gloves might be a good idea this year.

DIRECTIONS TO SATURDAY MORNING MEETING LOCATION:

From the intersection of South China Lake Blvd and Hwy 395 proceed across Hwy 395 and head northwest about 2.8 miles on Brown Road to the big powerlines where we will meet on the south side of Brown Road. From Hwy 178 in Inyokern, take South Brown Road south 7.1 miles to the powerline road.

DIRECTIONS TO SEARCHERS ENCAMPMENT AND SUNDAY MORNING MEETING LOCATION:

From the intersection of South China Lake Blvd and Hwy 395 proceed across Hwy 395 and head northwest about 4.0 miles on Brown Road to Wicknich Rd. (at the Ridgecrest Gun Range) and proceed southwest on Wicknich Rd. a mile or two to the Searchers encampment. From Hwy 178 in Inyokern, take South Brown Road south 5.9 miles to Wicknich road.

Mojave National Preserve to close 18-mile Cima Road, limit path to historic sites for year

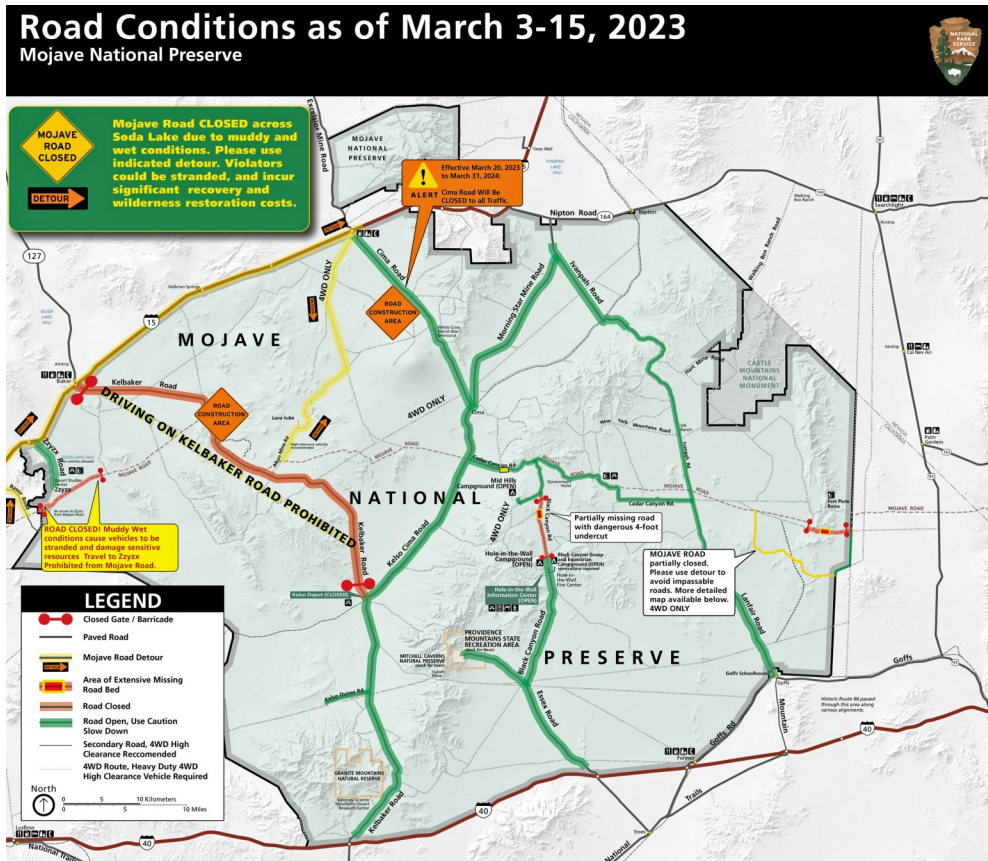
The Mojave National Preserve will close all 18 miles of a major northern access road for more than a year to launch a \$24 million infrastructure-improvement project.

The project, which starts Monday, will limit people's ability to visit some historic natural sites and a World War 1 memorial. The roughly 2,500-square-mile Mojave Desert park plans to designate the entirety of Cima Road an active construction zone and close it from March 20 this year to March 31, 2024, the U.S. National Park Service announced Tuesday night.

The road connects to Interstate 15 at exit 272 along Mojave National Preserve's northern boundary. It runs south into the federally-protected park until ending at Kelso Cima Road and Morning Star Mine Road.

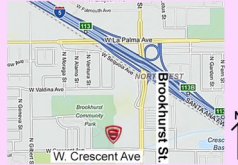

This map shows sites of obsidian in SE CA, AZ, NM, and northern Mexico. Visit his site for the interactive map with descriptions of each site noted in the map. Obsidian is a volcanic glass suitable for tool making – knives, arrow and spearheads, scrapers, and drills."

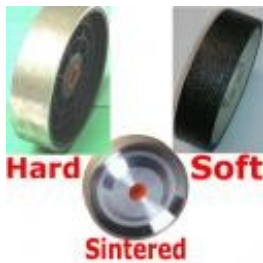

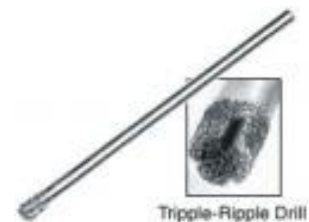
