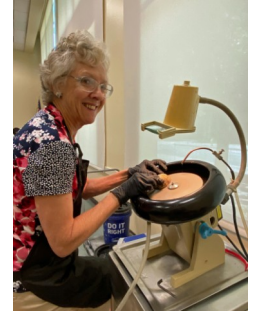

1. May 2, 2023 Board Meeting Minutes, May 9 General Membership Meeting minutes, approved with spelling corrections.
2. Club Communication: Board voted unanimously to approve the following measures for general meetings.
 - a) Speaker presentation before the Searchers' business part of meeting if a member vote is required. The President is to keep meeting on track of timeline. Make sure to leave time for adequate discussion by the members.
 - b) Written agenda for these general meetings, president recognizes people before they can speak.

Presentation:

The presentation was given by Dick Weber about diamond mining at the Argyle Mine in Australia.

The Carlyle Mine was the largest diamond mine in the world for 37 years. It had rare pink diamonds, not found anywhere else. The mine is in the Kimberley's. In 1969 miners started to look for the source of alluvial diamonds found on some of the creeks. In 1979 they found huge amounts of diamonds in Smoke Creek where it dumped into Lake Argyle. The diamonds were finally found in non-sandy tuff in an area 1.2 miles long. They drilled 200 bore holes to determine how rich the deposit was.

The mine turned out to be the richest diamond mine in the world. It is a fly-in, fly-out mine. There are no reliable roads into the area. They mined 17 million karats per year. The deeper material was higher in quality so they drilled deep and mined from the of the deposit up. The operation was controlled remotely from the top. Of the diamonds that were mined 25% were fine diamonds, 25% were chocolate diamonds and the rest were industrial diamonds.

The mine was owned and operated by Rio Tinto and was closed in 2021. There will be a 5-year reclamation project to complete the mining at the Argyle.

Upcoming Fields Trips

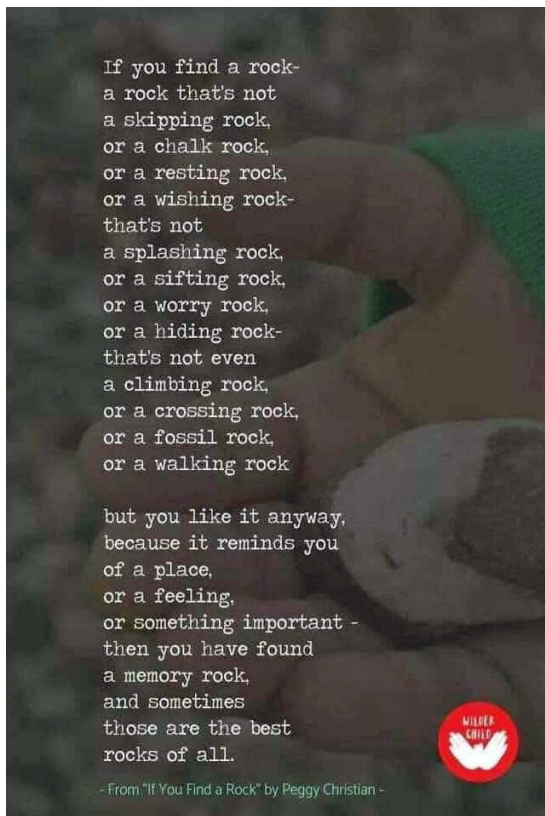

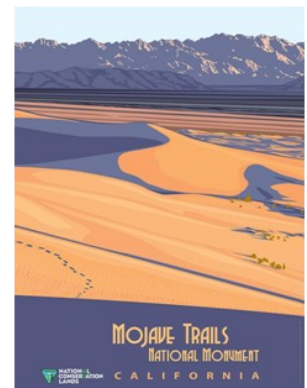

Scoping period now open for Mojave Trails and the CDCA Plan

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is accepting comment letters NOW on the Mojave Trails Monument Management Plan AND the California Deserts Conservation Plan (CDCA). The CDCA Plan will be amended to serve as the primary (we think) authority for deciding what activities will be permitted in the monument.

A make or break moment.

The current comment period may be the single most important opportunity for rockhounds to tell BLM what they want for Mojave Trails. SDMG will submit a comment letter to BLM on June 29, 2023. It asks BLM to expressly include rockhounding as a permissible activity in the monument management plan AND what collecting areas should stay open. (Anything not written into the plan will be off limits.)

Not light reading.

Apologies in advance, dear reader, for torturing you with excruciating detail. Fortify yourself with a strong cup of coffee and please hang in there. To write an effective letter on behalf of rockhounds, we studied the bureaucratic minutiae so you don't have to, unless you want to. By all means, do write your own letters! The more letters BLM receives the better. **BLM's deadline is July 5, 2023.** For information on how to submit a letter directly to BLM, visit the **BLM National NEPA Register web page** at: <https://bit.ly/blm-nepa2023>.

Your feedback on the SDMG letter and participation is appreciated.

We are happy to consider your suggested emendations to improve the letter and fill in the gaps, especially on collecting areas. Thank you in advance for giving us feedback.

Please consider being a signatory to SDMG's letter.

Organizations and individuals are welcome. It will help for BLM to know who you are, if you include a few details like your club affiliations (see samples at the end of the letter).

Do you know what our highest expenses are for our 2023 show? Brookhurst Center staffing, table rental and security. Together these total over \$5,700. Our expenses (supplies, services, decoration, and advertising) total over \$9,100. Putting on a show is a massive accomplishment and is completely due to our hard-working Show Committee and club volunteers. You make it happen! Our net income from the show is over \$8,400. 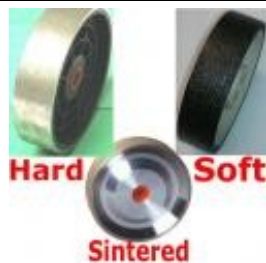

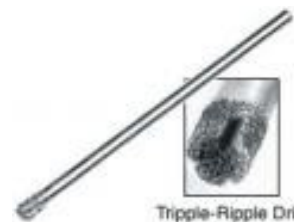
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
