

June Speaker: Dick Weber



Dick Weber is a retired exploration geologist and mineral collector. He has worked and traveled as a geologist throughout most of North America. The Weber's also spent a year in New Zealand and Australia examining the geology and visiting numerous major mining areas of that region. He has been an active member of the Conejo Gem and Mineral Club for more than 20 years, serving as president and treasurer. The Weber's enjoy exhibiting their speci-

Geology & History of the Argyle Diamond Mine Western Australia

The Argyle Diamond mine was discovered in 1979 in an extremely remote area of Western Australia. One of the richest diamond mines in the world, it was the source of almost all of the world's natural pink diamonds. At the time of it's closure in November of 2021, it was known as one of the largest diamond producers

in the world.

Geologist Dick Weber was able to visit and photograph this mine during his year-long "walkabout" in Australia. He will tell the fascinating story of the exploration that lead to the discovery of this deposit. Dick will describe the geology of the formation of the lamprolite pipe that forms the host rock for these unusual multicolored diamonds. He will also explain their unique connection with our own U. S. diamond deposit in Arkansas.

Some of the oldest fossils in Orange County are in the Bedford Canyon Group and are from the Jurassic. Thes include sea turtles, ammonites, clams, oysters and snails.

Later fossils that have been found are laurel leaves, club foot moss, a little rhino, oreodonts and a crocodilian. There were also musk deer in the area.

Miocene fossils include palm fronds in the Topanga Formation. Also, marine fossils have been found from this period that include shark teeth and vertebrae. There was even a very large vertebra found from a megalodon shark. In deep trenches lantern fish lived.

In the Mio Pliocene shark teeth were found as well as large walrus with no big tusks In the Pleistocene there were no ice sheets here and the ocean was warmer than it is today. Large mammals roamed the landscape including, mammoths, Harlans ground sloth and the long-horned bison.

There are really no public lands to collect fossils on in Orange County. If you do happen to find something: leave it, document it, photograph it and report it. Volunteers are needed help with fossil prep work. Contact copa@ocparks.com.


Sunday we checked out the Hector Hills and found some amazing pieces of agate and other material, but we were tired and were packed up by noon and on the road home.
