



Mojave Trails National Monument Management Planning Update

The Mojave Trails National Monument holds many of our most important California rock-collecting areas such as Lavic Siding, the Marble Mountains, and the historic collecting areas and roads of the Cady Mountains.

The Anaheim Searchers have a long history of rock-collecting advocacy, so the talk will update you on what we are fighting for and have accomplished so far. I'll also give an update on what we can do next.

Gregor Losson is a member of Southern California Friends of Mineralogy board and Mineralogical Society of Southern California. He participated in the 13 years of the BLM's West Mojave Plan in order to keep access to our collecting areas of the Cady Mountains and turned that work into the 200 pg. "Established Roads of the Mojave Desert, Vol. 1, the Cady Mountains." He is the Gem and Mineral Collecting Representative on the Mojave Trails Subgroup of the BLM's Desert Advisory Committee.

Field Trip Copper World June 1-2 2024 (POSTPONED)

On June 1 & 2, 2024, we will be traveling to 'Copper World', an area in the Clark Mountain range, 35 miles west of Primm, Nevada. Campsite meeting: 8:30 a.m. on Saturday. You can collect at many mines

within the area. The most notable being the Mohawk and Copper World Mines.

Directions: Head towards Las Vegas on I 15 for about 4 hours by car and 5 hours by RV. When you pass Baker, continue another 30 miles to the Cima Road exit. There is a Stuckey's store sign clearly visible from the freeway. At the stop sign turn left, which will take you over the freeway and to the Searcher's campsite which will be about 0.5 miles up on the left side.

'Copper World's mining history spans from 1868 to 1978, however the mines are inactive today. Malachite in veins and stringers (of basalt) give the effect of spiderweb turquoise in brown matrix. Copper King, Mohawk and other mines are the result of extensive diggings which produced lead, copper, silver, and gold, as well as hematite, pyrite, galena and zinc. Latest collections include Azurite, Malachite (blue), Chrysolite, Chrysocolla, Chalcopyrite (green), possibly even Smithsonite, Calcite, Sphalerite, Hemimorphite, Limonite, and Cerussite.

Note: Some minerals will only be found within mine tunnels but most can be found as smaller specimens on the abundant dumps. Club members will help identify specimens.

What to bring: Food, water, and wood. It is a dry campsite with supplies, restrooms, and gas nearby @ Stuckey's. Sunscreen, hats, and dress for the variable, desert weather. Tools: Flashlights, picks, chisels, sledgehammers, rope, gads, carry bags, etc.

Road conditions: Typical desert roads except for the last mile to the Copper World. Exploring beyond is a bit steep and rough. The Searchers camp is ok for Trailers or RV's.



Clear Creek Field Trip Report May 18-19

On a beautiful Saturday, May 18, a caravan of 14 Searchers embarked on the first trip to the amazing Plasma Agate mine and fields in several years. There were the usual Searcher Field Trippers plus some new (and returning) faces like Jose, Madison, Bert, George, and Anna. While most of the group made the long slog out of Southern California, two of the attendees came all the way from Washington State – Doug and Inez Flaugh – saying they love Clear Creek and it's even better with their Searcher friends!



The campsite was beautiful nestled in an oak woodland, far from civilization. As is typical, the camping is dry (no water except what we bring) even though this site had clean pit toilets. It was quiet and except for one other camper we had the place to ourselves.

This is the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) Clear Creek Management Area, an area that hosts a large variety of minerals and both the California State rock – Serpentine, and one of the few places to find the rare California State Gemstone – Benitoite. Serpentine (Mohs 3-6) is a usually greenish metamorphic rock found in many places in California. Its surface is smooth but flaky-looking, much like the snake it's named after. In its early formation it is fairly soft but over the eons it can harden to a dense, near gem-like stone and look much like jade or jadeite. Benitoite is a fairly durable gemstone (Mohs 6-6.5) that is rarely found outside this small area in California. It boasts a sapphire-blue coloration with high dispersion so it sparkles like a diamond, but while it is fairly hard, it can be chipped with solid blows. We did not look for Benitoite, and while we found a lot of serpentine, the real focus was on Plasma Agate, a hard multi-colored jasper-like like rock that polishes beautifully.

Our usual locale for the Searchers produced some fine, large specimens of the Plasma. The collecting area was a mine-like depression in a hillside that had been worked for some time. The overburden was quite fragile and yet several of the brave/foolhardy Searchers climbed to the top of the hillside and using sledge hammers and wedges forced the rocks out of the ground and over the edge. "TIMBER!", or "Fire in the Hole!", or just "Look Out Below!" After that came the next step of getting those large samples down to the road by rolling them down. It was an effort and we almost lost one over the road's edge, but it stopped in time.

The variety of the collecting seemed much better to me (the avowed non-rockhound) than in previous years, and I'm sure we'll be seeing some nice examples coming through the shop and at meetings in the near future. Jimmie Petersen took his usual large pieces of rough for his spheres. But there were many others with large, small, and tumbler-sized that everyone went back to the camp happy. Once there we rested before our usual Saturday potluck and campfire swapping stories of our youth.

Sunday was open and the sponsored trip was over. Some folks left for home, some sought out mines and other

mineral-rich areas, and some went back to the good spots from Saturday for yet more plasma. I guess when the rocks are bitin' ya

gotta keep throwing your line in.

Thanks to all who attended and helped with the organizing and special thanks to Doug and Jimmie who remembered where it was and how to get there.
